Discussion

It might be noted that for the two largest insurers in my sample, Allianz and NRMA the numbers are similar to the mean for all doctors. In the other two, my sample size is small, which may make my result less valid. Also while the disparity between the denial rates of 44 and 21% may seem large, the fact that Suncorp/GIO is 45% of other doctors, yet only 21% of my sample is the main reason for this disparity.

However the interference in doctor's treatments by insurers is so significant as to undermine what is 'reasonable and necessary' treatments. The refusal of even 21% of radiology requests ordered by treating doctors is a gross interference with reasonable practice.
